Method of Bleaching Ivory. To bleach ivory ornaments or piano keys the following method works well. The ornaments are first washed or "soaked," if possible, in a bath of unslaked lime, which has in it a few ounces of bran and water. This should make a pasty solution if properly mixed, and will bleach the ivory which is discolored or stained. It should be rubbed off with a cloth and the ivory dried in magnesia powder. After a few minutes a few strokes with a cloth gives the ivory a brilliant polish.

Sensitive Plant Life. The craving of plants and trees for water has sometimes led them to terrible extremes. A poplar has been known to burrow beneath a wall, under a road, and down a well—all in search of water, and a pertinacious turnip which got the tip of its root into the crack in a field drain went on and on until it was six feet long in the drain.
