#### NEW YORK TO HAVE STATE BIRD

Contest Close Between Quail and Robin for the Honor

The quail and the robin are racing for first place in a popularity contest to determine the New York state bird. Early spring appearances of the robin are helping its cause with the school children, whose ballots are being sent to Mrs. Charles Cyrus Marshall, chairman of conservation for the New York State and City Federations of Women's clubs.

Club members, on the other hand, are almost unanimous in choosing the quail, on the ground that it stays in the state all the year. Song birds are now protected, while game birds are being exterminated, say the women. Other birds which have leading places in the contest are the goldfinch, bluebird and kingbird.

The results of the contest will be announced the first week in April, when New York state club women will celebrate national conservation week. Speeches will be made by Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Tree association; William F. Wells of the State Conservation commission; Mrs. William H. Purdy, president of the state federation, and Mrs. Harry H. Thomas, president of the city federation. Groups of nature songs are being arranged by Mrs. Harold Vincent Milligan and Mrs. Marshall, who has charge of the celebration, will direct nature tableaux.

John Burroughs will be honored at a meeting at 3:30 o'clock on the afternoon of April 3 at the Manhattan Congregational church, at which Rev. Edwin Emmet will speak and there will be music arranged by Mrs. Milligan.

#### State Seeks New Tax Fields

Interest and sinking fund charges on bond issues already authorized in excess of \$500,000,000, the increasing aid that is being given by the state to schools, and the constantly mounting overhead costs of government have driven both Alfred E. Smith, governor, and Republican legislative leaders to a search for new methods of taxation for 1928, 1929 and later years.

For this year the problem has been solved by abandonment of the 25 per cent income tax cut and agreement upon the enactment of a gasoline tax, but the state's expenditures, which were \$186,000,000 in 1926, have jumped to an estimated figure of \$215,000,000 for this year and it is predicted will jump even higher next year—\$220,000,000 at least, it is said, and perhaps more. Revenues are not increasing as rapidly.

Investigation of tax possibilities for the future is now being made both by the legislative committee on taxation and by the state department of taxation and finance. Complete revision of the system of taxation and the establishment of a 1 per cent sales tax on all retail commodities are being studied.
