

NEWSPAPER TOLD WASHINGTON RIFES

Kingston Paper of 1800 Carried a Story of His Funeral

"Alas! The sun of glory was set forever. No, the name of Washington—the American President and General—will triumph over death."

In the above words the Ulster County Gazette of Kingston ended its lengthy, black-bordered obituary of George Washington, Theopary dated January 4, 1800, was found in a vacant apartment and sent to the Congressional library in Washington, D. C.

The story of Washington's burial had a simple heading: "On Wednesday last the mortal part of Washington The Great—Father of His Country and the friend of man—was consigned to the tomb with solemn honors and funeral pomp * * * A multitude of persons assembled at Mount Vernon * * * The great soul has gone * * * his mortal part was there indeed * * * how awful the spectacle of such a worth and greatness thus to mortal eyes fall—"

"Those who paid the last sad honors to the benefactor of his country took an impressive—a farewell view. On the ornament at the head of the casket, was inscribed Surge ad Judicium; about the middle of the coffin, Gloria Dei, and on the silver plate, General George Washington."

Should Learn Game Law The necessity of being familiar with the game law is well exemplified in a recent case which occurred near Toddsville. In some way the news reached one of the game wardens, who visited the home and confiscated the bird the head of the household being taken before a justice where a civil penalty of \$12.50 was recovered.

In such a case it is not pertinent as to how possession of such game was secured, the offense is possession. The game warden recognized that the pheasant had probably been killed by a dog, but the offense having been called to his attention it was his duty to recover the penalty.

Father and Son in Jail Marvin S. Darling, 23, of Walton reluctantly came to Delhi Tuesday night to spend a few days with his father, Jay Darling, who is confined in the county jail. Following his arrest by Police Chief Alton Bartlett of Walton, young Darling pleaded not guilty to a disorderly conduct charge before Police Justice P. B. Williams. The justice decided against him, and sentenced him to thirty days. His father, Jay Darling, had been given a similar sentence by Justice Williams February 12, following a plea of guilty to a charge of public intoxication. Marvin Darling is not unfamiliar with the Delhi jail, having been found guilty of a minor offense November 21, 1930, for which he received a three months sentence.

Toll of Tuberculosis

Drops to All-Time Low Washington.—American health authorities have reduced the tuberculosis death rate to the lowest ever recorded, Surgeon Gen. H. S. Cumming declared in a report to congress.

The general health of the people of the country during 1930 and the first half of 1931 was "exceptionally good," Doctor Cumming said. The tuberculosis death rate last year was only 68.5 deaths to every 100,000 population, as compared with 73.1 in 1929 and 76.4 in 1928. In 1900 the death rate from this disease was 201.9. This represents a saving of 100,000 lives.

In contrast to other diseases, infantile paralysis was more prevalent in 1930, but declined in 1931. Typhoid fever and diphtheria deaths declined.

Fellagra, caused by poor nutrition, increased in 1931.

Flyer Plunges 16,000 Feet as Oxygen Fails Mount Clemens, Mich.—On squadron flight 20,000 feet aloft, Lieut. George A. Hersam, army pilot, felt himself losing consciousness. He struggled for air, tugging at his oxygen mask.

"Then," he later described the experience, "I passed out." Lieuts. Hugh Coleman and Emmet O'Donnell, two of the other eleven pilots flying from Selfridge field to Washington, saw their comrade's plane dive, and zigzag downward.

Somewhere, 16,000 feet below, Lieutenant Hersam recovered consciousness, and straightened his plunging plane to an even flight. His labored lungs were relieved. He followed the squadron to Bolling field, and was welcomed by the comrades who thought him lost.

Floral Cards Cause of Mixup at New Orleans New Orleans.—Upon the occasion of the opening of a new store at W. H. Alexander, president of the chain store company, received tons of floral offerings. Among the expressions was a bunch of flowers to which was attached a card reading: "May you rest in peace." Alexander was puzzled and called upon the florist. "Oh, that is terrible," came the answer. "I have mixed your card with some one else's."

An investigation showed a bouquet went to a funeral reading: "Congratulations and best wishes in your new undertaking."
